All scouts will stay at Camp Freedom. There are two options for camp.

<u>Base camp</u> — all age scouts, dining hall meals, cope, merit badges (include water sports and climbing). Daily camp wide activities for the acorn award include, polar bear swim/mile, iron man, orienteering.

Cost - \$345/ scouts and \$160 adults

Paymt. schedule – **adults** \$25 deposit/\$60 due Nov. 16^{th} /\$75 due Feb 15^{th} . **Scouts** \$25 deposit/\$120 due Nov. 16^{th} /\$200 due Feb. 15th

Daily Trek Camp – available to scouts who are 13 years old at start of camp. Choice of 3 daily treks, which may include, caving and rappelling, fly fishing, kayaking, hiking, pedal & paddle, rock climbing, white water

rafting, and mountain biking.

Cost - \$345 both scouts and adults.

Paymt. schedule - \$25 deposit/\$120 due Nov. 16^{th} /\$200 due Feb.15th

*Treks will be available to adults if there are spots available. This will be determined during camp. Refunds for adults will be based on how many treks you participated in.

Outpost Adventure — An outpost adventure will be available to our entire troop one night, set up by the camp sponsors. We will travel to a remote area in camp by hiking, biking or canoeing, spend the night and return the following morning.
